Objectives

- Support to the peer learning activities on QA within the Bologna Follow – up Group and the Bologna process
- Analyze of various categories of stakeholders' involvement in QA
- Analyze of stakeholders' expectations towards external quality assurance work
- Sharing best practices among QAAs', in regard to including stakeholders in EQA activities and ongoing development of practices
- Support provided to the national authorities and QAAs in terms of stakeholders' involvement, on ways to strengthen dialogue and cooperation with stakeholders, as well as for their effective involvement in QA processes

■ 1 study at European Higher Education Area (EHEA) member countries level, mapping the involvement of stakeholders in external QA activities and identifying examples of good practices

■ 2 peer review activities, to identify the strong and weak areas in what concerns the involvement of stakeholders in the partner QAAs procedures, governance structures etc., that included workshops, with participation of different categories of stakeholders from the respective country, as well as the national authority for HE

Copenhagen, 2 – 4 December 2019

- Thorough analysis of the way in which stakeholders are involved in the external quality assurance activities of three of the partner agencies:
 - National Evaluation and Accreditation Agency
 NEEA from Bulgaria,
 - The Danish Accreditation Institution DAI from Denmark
 - and Agency National Quality Assurance in Education and Research - ANACEC from Moldova.




■ **Different categories of stakeholders** participated: student unions, teaching staff representatives, the Council of Rectors, internal quality assurance department directors, teachers' unions, employers, professional and nongovernmental associations.



■ Two sessions of interactive "Questions and discussions": what is Quality of Higher Education, what works, what doesn't work and what to be done to enhance the contribution of Stakeholders' involvement in QA; identify the strong and weak areas in what concerns the involvement of stakeholders.






The High Council for Evaluation of Research and Higher Education (Hcéres) and The Danish Accreditation Institution (DAI) representatives had a presentation about Stakeholder involvement in France and Denmark - similarities and differences.

- Adam Gajek, former President of the European Students' Union (ESU), talked about New opportunities/challenges for students' participation brought by the latest trends in learning (digitalization, remote learning etc.).
- Professor Bert van der Zwaan has presented his perspective upon Stakeholder's Involvement in the Changing Landscape of Higher Education in 2020-2040, identifying students, employers, faculties and government as the most influent stakeholders in higher education in the future.





- One session of interactive discussions: on what good practices, as well as deficiencies, have encountered by involving in quality assurance activities and how can stakeholders and institutions work closely together in the light of changing environments to meet future challenges;
- DAI shared their experience on student involvement and how to cultivate a rewarding collaboration, as well as on the development of new guidelines for institutional evaluation through dialogue with the external stakeholders, especially representatives of higher education institutions.



Signe Tolstrup Mathiasen, Vice President of The National Union of Students in Denmark (DSF), has presented the perspective of students on involvement in internal and external quality assurance activities.

- 2 peer review activities
 - Diversity of knowledge, perspective and expectations on QA by different categories of stakeholders;
 - Provide feedback back to the Stakeholder's and showing the impact and value of their work are essential to motivate and strenghten their further actions and involvement;
 - Continous cooperation and co-ownership within the process;
 - National and local context should be always considered.

- <u>1 peer-learning</u> activity, as part of one of the meetings of the Group on QA within the BFUG, with the participation of QAAs from the EHEA
- <u>1 Guideline</u> on involvement of stakeholders (July 2020)
 - > define the profile and role of different stakeholders,
 - procedures for their recruitment, in accordance with the profile defined,
 - rincluding approaches for increased communication, and
 - role of different categories of stakeholders.

- 1 online peer-learning activity, based on the Guideline, with the participation of QAAs from EHEA countries (June July 2020)
- <u>5 analyses</u> on how the provisions of the *Guideline on involvement of stakeholders* can be applied in EQA activities of the partner QAAs, including concrete milestones and a timeline for the implementation of the Guideline (*Frebruary 2021*)

- It is expected to bring important changes in the practices of QA agencies related to stakeholders' involvement, which on long term will result in increased relevance and impact of QA activities in higher education.
- The three European organizations members in the partnership will reflect the outcomes of the project upon their own tools and instruments focused on stakeholders' engagement and communication.
- Benchmarking and development of recommendations in evaluation activities.
- The interest of stakeholders' organizations to participate in QA activities will be raised, while they will be empowered for increased engagement and more effective participation.

Sustainability

- Each QAAs partner in the consortium will implement the recommendations established in the analyse reports, allocating the necessary human resources and funds, accordingly.
- The consortium will continue to promote involvement of stakeholders in QA in HE, according to the ESG and the Paris Communiqué, as a core value of quality assurance.
- Building a quality culture and empowering stakeholders to participate in EQA are long term effects of the project, assuring the sustainability of its activities and results.
